The Science of Trek



Researchers at New York University believe that a Holodeck could be the learning environment of the future.

Winslow Burleson, an associate professor focusing on educational technology at NYU, belives that a network of interconnected 'Holodecks' could help people to crowdsource inventive solutions to societal problems. His goal, and the goal of the team that he is leading, is to use the NYU Experiential Super Computer (the Holodeck) to combine touch based controls, feedback and the VR technology with computers to simulate everything from environmental to societal encyironments in real time.

The system that they are working on will track the user's movcements, as well as psychological states via heart rate, sweating and voice cues, to help personalize the experience. The use of virtual learning assistants and even robotics will help to guide users as they learn, not only to use the system, but as they learn within it.

While the development of Holodeck at NYU is fueled primarily by the teams desire to create a virtual environment in which people can work together to solve problems such as climate change, or drug policy, the VR tech that makes it possible has been developed primarily for and by the Gaming community.

Burleson says that the team has already shown that HD camera arrays can pick up the positions of all of the users and objects and project them into a virtual scene through VR Goggles. They have created a 3D sound system that can accurately recreate different acoustic spaces.

Working with NASA and the Exploratorium, researchers have designed the robotic and and virtual assistant technology that the Holodeck will need.

Of course, at this time the technology of Star Trek's Holodeck is still a ways off. However, with the amazing VR tech we already have available, a super computer, and some serious brainiacs working on the problem...it won't be long now!

I travel a great deal for work so proper planning makes all the difference between a rushed, stressful trip and a restful, worry-free trip. Luckily, smartphones and tablets are here to help, thanks to the apps they hold. From trip planners and itinerary generators, to online marketplaces for accommodations and establishments, crowd-sourced reviews and more, there's no shortage of applications to ensure your trip goes smoothly.

Here is a selection of apps, available in Android or iOS, I use that could be of great use to travelers.

AIRLINE APPS

Just about every airline has their own official app that you can log in on and get up to the moment flight info, or find last minute flights with ease. It is somewhat difficult to rate and rank all of these airline apps, since many of them offer exactly the same thing, but they can be very helpful to not only see your flight information. But receive up to the minute gate change announcement, airport maps, and requests for upgrades. They are also handy in case your flight is cancelled and you need to find out the next flight to your destination. I use America Airline, Alaska, and on occasion United.

SeatGuri

News flash: you don't have to pay for a costly upgrade to get extra legroom on your next flight. SeatGuru's search tool lets you look for seats with maximum pitch, power outlets, in-flight entertainment, and Wi-Fi. Want to shop like a pro? Check the site's plane charts before booking your ticket to make sure you're not sacrificing precious inches for a slightly lower fare.

TripAdvisor

TripAdvisor is your crowd-sourced guide to hotels, restaurants and attractions worldwide. TripAdvisor allows you to browse through millions of reviews, images and videos featur-

ing various establishments worldwide. You can also access contact details; search for nearby establishments; explore restaurants by food type, price range or rating; check out air fares; and even add to the knowledge base by posting your own reviews, images and entries for the places you visit.

GasBuddy

If road trips are more your thing, consider GasBuddy, a mobile app that helps users track down the cheapest gas in their region. Users can use their GPS location, or search by address or zip code. As many of the prices are based on user reports, GasBuddy rewards users with points for reporting and updating a station's prices, with points making you eligible for regular raffles of prizes like free gas.

XE Currenc

XE Currency's excellent currency conversion app is everything you'll ever need when you find yourself in need of prices and exchange rates abroad. The app supports just about every national currency used worldwide, with the ability to track up to 10 simultaneously. Rates are regularly updated (you can set the frequency), and best of all, the app stores the rates of currencies you've looked up, so that they're <u>always available offline</u>, even away from Wi-Fi or a mobile connection.

Booking.con

Most hotel discount sites make you front cash (or at least a credit card number) to get a deal. Not so with Booking.com, which often lets you lock in a price and pay when you arrive (or cancel without penalty). Your options include hotels, B&B's, guesthouses, villas, and more, each with a score that factors in value, cleanliness, location, and comfort. Bonus: call the customer service hotline and you'll be connected to attentive, helpful staffers. Not endless voice-activated menus and recordings.

The Weather Channel

Thanks to a recent redesign, this app is easier than ever to navigate: current weather is at your fingertips, along with hourly and 10-day forecasts and motion-based radar maps. Pollen indexes and airport conditions are handy extras for iPhone users.

Yelp



If you're looking for a good read this summer are greatly in evidence here. Baxter takes a consider Stephen Baxter's latest book Proxima. A worthwhile chunk of time detailing a fascinating story about a risky colony mission to a tidally locked planet focuses on our lead character Yuri. This is an out-of-time remnant of "The Heroic Generation", whose energy intensive geoengineering efforts to sort out global warming caused more problems than it solved. Popped into cryo-stasis by parents hoping for a better future, he wakes up into a world that resents him for his association with the disastrous past. He's not treated well, and that includes being shipped off on the dodgy, bare-bones colony effort to the Alpha Centauri multiple star system. His struggles to remain alive, and the mysteries he uncovers on the way, form one of the novel's two major strands. The other strand takes place in the Solar System, where the cold war between the expansionist Chinese Empire and the constituent countries of the United Nations is heating up. Alien artifacts have been discovered on Mercury, and UN the isn't sharing.

Baxter captures the same science fiction mystery design we have come to enjoy with Arthur C. Clark. It no too much of a reach to say Baxter can be Clarke's natural successor. Clarkian tropes but we're sufficiently hooked to come back for such as mysterious extra-terrestrial leavings, deep time and the sinister majesty of the cosmos

planetary ecology for "Per Ardua" as the colonists end up calling their world. This is ingeniously alien, and includes a banded series of biospheres. Rather than possessing cells like Earth life, the creatures of Per Ardua are made of much larger, interchangeable "stems" with the result that they behave somewhat like predatory Lego, brutally disassembling one another and using the parts to create their own young. The depth and ingenuity of this part of the tale has me thinking of Clarke's efforts in Rendezvous with Rama. Similarly well set out are Baxter's various modes of space travel, which include a multi-year colony mission, a one man cosmic dash, and an interesting take on interstellar sailing, where the vessel contains tens of thousands of disposable sails, each invested consciousness.

But there's a lot more in Proxima besides alternate realities, wormholes, Teilhardian galactic consciousnesses, and a couple of mysteries set up for the next book on both human and cosmological scales. That's right, this is number one of two,
