Re: Appointment of Region 4 Regional Coordinator



I have received word from the Inspector General's Office that, in the matter of the Region 4 Regional Coordinator Election, Vice Admiral Jerry Tien has received a majority of the nominations cast and has met the eligibility requirements to serve as the Regional Coordinator.

Here is the official verbiage from the Inspector General's Office:

"Based on the poling of the Commanding Officers of Region 4, and based on the withdrawal of both Chrissy Killian and Joshua Andrews, it is my duty to declare the end of the Region 4 election. As there was only one valid candidate, it is my pleasure to announce that VADM Jerry Tien has won the election, and has been named as Region 4 Coordinator, Elect, with all the rights and privileges afforded this post. He shall take office on March 1, 2012 and serve until February 28, 2014. May God have mercy on his soul."

So, in accordance with STARFLEET rules, Vice Admiral Jerry Tien is hereby recognized as the winning said election and is appointed to the position of Regional Coordinator of Region 4 effective on March 1, 2012.

Vice Admiral Tien, you are directed to proceed forthwith and to begin transition activities with Vice Admiral Chrissy Killian in preparation to assume the command of Starbase 4 and the Fourth Fleet. Also, the USS Eagle shall be authorized to serve as the Flagship of Region 4 as of March 1, 2012.

I look forward to your participation on the Admiralty Board as the representative of STARFLEET Region 4. Congratulations, Jerry, and best wishes for your future success!

Their attention to detail was amazing and the scenery will take your breath away. We felt we were transported to Diagon Alley and expected to see Harry around the corner. The Forbidden Journey motion ride, one of three in this section, was much more exciting than I thought it could be. They have come a long way since the Star Trek Experience. We mostly walked around enjoying the scenery, the shops, and split a pumpkin juice. It was very sweet, but enjoyable nonetheless. We had lunch at The Three Broomsticks. The food was great and it really is like the pubs we saw in England but busier than they could ever imagine. The rest of the park, there are many other things to see as well. 
The next day was devoted to Universal Orlando. They have many of the same things that the Hollywood Universal does, so we stuck to the differences. We started in the Hollywood/Beverly Hills area. All the shops on Rodeo Drive were present and they had an excellent tribute to Lucille Ball. The Disaster experience was fun. This was an interactive attraction that follows the storyline of a fake movie studio run by Christopher Walken. Using people from the audience, they take you through the movie making process before you end up on the actual ride in a subway station. Once onboard lights start to flicker, the train is shaken by a violent earthquake, sections of the roof collapse, a gasoline truck falls through the ceiling and bursts into flames, another subway train enters the station and derails, and a flash flood of water rushes down the stairs and into the station. Pretty exciting and give you a sense on how movies are made. The Men in Black ride was much more interactive than I thought it would be. Who doesn't enjoy zapping aliens and winning points? I was expecting a little more out of the Twister ride. We lined up on a platform under a roof overlooking a simulated outdoor scene. We see dark clouds roll overhead, a tree get struck by lightning, hear sirens going off, and feel the strong winds. Then a simulated tornado drops from the sky in the middle of a building. Pretty amazing to watch them make a tornado, but not much to the experience. The Blues Brothers show was very entertaining. Ron has been a Jake and Elwood fan for a long time and could sing along to their classic hits. Their takes on Christmas music made people dance in the street. They did an amazing job but how could anyone doubt it, they're on a mission from God. After the show, we ended up having a quiet lunch at Finnegan's Pub (I guess we just have a thing for the UK) and had a really nice lunch.

The Horror Make-up Show was interesting and a lot of laughs. The preshow area takes place inside the theater lobby which includes multiple displays of Universal horror films, such as Hellboy, Psycho, The Thing, and Chucky. Soon we enter the small theater, where the two hosts crack jokes and share some of the secrets involved with the making of some famous horror movies. The Simpsons Ride was over the top! You walk through a long queue and along the way there are so many sights and sounds on TV screens and posters from the Simpson's world. You and seven other park guest steps inside a room for a quick safety brief, get on a car, and are off on a crazy ride. It's simulated to make you feel as if you're on a roller coaster. Although the car never leaves the room, based on the simulation, you'll feel as if you went to different themed areas in Springfield. It was a very full two days and nice to spend some us time for a change. But if you are thinking about going to Orlando, the Universal Parks really do have something for everyone. There are things for the little ones, the roller coaster/ thrill ride folks and even something for the casual observers such as ourselves.
